Epworth is a registered Section 21 and NPO entity operating on BBBEE Level 2. We are an operational NGO, meaning we plan and carry out programmes to accomplish our objectives. This requires a great deal of careful planning, communication, and local involvement for each programme.

The Epworth Children's Home Child and Youth Care Centre is a residential care facility for children placed through the Children's Court. The village provides a structured living environment in which the children are encouraged to develop and utilise appropriate behaviour and social skills. These objectives are met through the therapeutic, educational, and recreational components of our programmes. As a result of the educational and therapeutic needs within the Home, we developed a specialized programme seventeen years ago which has evolved into the development of a growing social enterprise. This programme is our Epworth Therapy and Assessment Centre and has become a successful and sought-after community resource.

### **Objectives of our Programmes**

- **Education**: According to Section 27 of the Constitution of South Africa and Article 26 of the Bill of Rights every child has the right to education. Epworth Children's Home ensures that all residents are placed in schools that best meet their educational needs.
- **Therapy**: Emotional resolution is attained through therapy and each child is assigned a therapist to help them resolve past trauma and foster better coping mechanisms.
- **Recreational**: Our Home seeks to provide children with opportunities to be reintegrated in the community through recreational programmes like soccer, netball, arts and cultural activities and church involvement in the community.
- **Epworth Children Therapy & Assessment Centre** addresses the needs of the children at Epworth, their families, and those in the community who do not have the financial means to access quality psychological services for educational support and mental health.
- **Psychological services** to children and families in Gauteng living in disadvantaged circumstances.
- **Educational assessments** and learning support to children experiencing barriers to learning who are unable to access these services privately.
- **IQ, school readiness**, subject choice and career assessments to children in disadvantaged circumstances through their schools.
- **Support and develop** the capacity of teachers and parents through topical workshops.
- Develop the capacity of children and teenagers through topical workshops.

# Minutes of the previous meeting

# MINUTES OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOMES HELD AT EPWORTH CHILDREN'S VILLAGE ON 14th of November 2019 at 10H00.

### 6. <u>FINANCIAL REVIEW</u>

The Accountant Maureen Prentice referred to the financial statements presented by the auditor highlighting the following points:

Page 3 – Audit Opinion – In our opinion the annual financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Epworth Childrens Home (NPC) as at 31 March 2018.

Page 7 – The bottom row of numbers indicate that the total equity dropped in 2018 from R354 979 in 2017 to R 102 194. This indicates that the financial position at the end of 2018 is worse than the previous year.

Page 8 – Shows the reason for the drop in equity: Donations decreased from R8.8m in 2017 to 6.6m in 2018. This is mainly due to receiving Lotto money in 2017 and not in 2018. However costs were contained and showed a decrease from R7.7m to R7.1m.

Page 3 – Audit Opinion. The auditors stated that in their opinion the annual financial statements are fairly presented and the audit was conducted in accordance with IRBA code.

Page 7 – Our equity being trade and other receivables, cash in bank dropped from R102 194 to R63 497 – This was a carry over from the previous year's weak position. Our financial position improved and we ended the year with a surplus of R483K. We have not managed to end the year in this situation for many years.

Page 8 - Income increased by R850K and we managed to contain our cost.

Page 14 – Loans amounting to R970K are unsecured, interest free and have no fixed repayment schedule. These loans assist in keeping Epworth solvent and should we close down the loans will be repaid from the sale of assets. Should we be fortunate enough to have surplus cash in the future we would repay the loans. There was R100K change in loans. One of the Lenders transferred R100K to donations to offset part of his loan.

Page 16- Summary of income

The Government Grant increased by R185K.

Donations and Therapy Centre increased by R665K. We thank all who support us, private individuals, Methodist Church, Trusts and Corporate donors. The Therapy Centre continues to cover the costs of all Therapy at Epworth.

We are still in a precarious position but the situation has strengthened over the past year and we are managing to meet all our overheads at the moment and hope to continue with this trend.

### 7. CHAIRPERSONS REPORT – REV. RON ROBERTSON

The Chairperson Rev Ron Robertson said his report represented the theme of Hope, and commitment to our work and spoke on how Epworth had celebrated its 100 Year on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of November, Epworth is for children whom have been born into the world with violence, abuse etc wondering what their future would look like.

The Chairperson Rev Ron Robertson thanked the staff for their commitment and quality of service they provided to the children at Epworth.

The Chairperson Rev Ron Robertson acknowledged the affect the Therapy & Assessment centre has had on the lives of children, been able to address issues much sooner and provided a journey of Hope to enable leaders.

The Chairperson Rev Ron Robertson thanked the community for their engagement and helping Epworth keep here doors open and seeing Epworth as a place of Hope.

### **Message from the Chairman**

### Year 101!

One hundred years ago, the year Epworth was birthed, the world was caught up in a global pandemic, called 'The Spanish Flu' of 1918. Some 50 million people died then, and we are now approaching a similar catastrophe today with the 'COVID 19 Pandemic'.

Year 101 is beginning to sound like a crash course on how to manage crises. During 2018 / 2019 we focused on our Centenary year and we're very grateful for the huge outpouring of love and support for Epworth as a long-established Mission project of the Church.

We would like to acknowledge the generosity and support of the many Methodist congregations and Organizations who have kept us uppermost in their expressions of generosity and support of the work at Epworth. We would also want to acknowledge a key sponsor, Nedbank, who have agreed to make us their key project with an emphasis on refurbishing the houses, inside and out!

Also, the fact that the Department of Social Development have agreed to increase substantially their subsidy to the Home (which also meant that we were thus enabled to divert some funding to at last give a long-overdue salary increase to our faithful – and long-suffering – staff)

Thank you one and all for your generous support of the work at Epworth.

During this period, we were also afforded the space, time, and resources to run a series of workshops to evaluate our journey and also to do some strategic planning into the future. Thank you, Nedbank!

Chief among these issues was the financial viability going forward as many of our regular donors have been changing their focus areas and the criteria for funding and that many of the grants are getting smaller by the year. Thus, our focus has had to turn to the question of our shape, primary focus and in-house resources into this new season.

Gratefully we found that we were in the right place and are playing a very a significant role in the community. The reflections highlighted significant 'in house' resources and experience of the staff in caring for the wide range of needs and issues of the children placed in our care; the Therapy and Assessment Centre (and the provision of an internship site for Psychology Masters students – now numbering some 80 students over the past 18 years), the results shown in the academic, social and general progress of the children during their time at Epworth show that we have much still offer the community in which we are placed.

Epworth is a place of healing and we are humbled by the achievement who have moved on into adult life beyond the Home and now play significant roles in their circles of influence.

It would be appropriate at this point to express on behalf of the Board our deep appreciation to our Director Ms Penny Lundie, the Social Workers, Child Care Staff, Support Staff, Interns and Volunteers. You are, as we have come to refer to you, the "A" Team! Enkosi!

Lock-down has once again shown that while each crisis presents its unique challenges, Epworth has despite them, proven to be a very special place.

# **Report from Antoinette Magda**

The year started with enrolling a student social auxiliary worker and a student social worker who showed enthusiasm in being part of the Epworth team. Six children were reunited with their families during the reporting period while two children were transferred to another residential care facility that was better able to meet their behavioural challenges. An additional two children were placed in foster care.

In March 2020 one of our older children was supported through the Idols' auditions but she however did not make it past the first round.

The home was also conditionally registered for a year as we do not have a fire clearance certificate. In an effort to get the certificate the fire department was contacted and part of the feedback that was received was that our pipes are for residential homes and therefore do not have enough pressure to sustain the hose needed. A suggestion was made to put 9kg fire extinguishers and have the fire department reassess, this process was however disrupted due to the lockdown.

We also managed to register a birth certificate for one of our children who did not have a birth certificate.

On the 17<sup>th</sup> of March 2020 one of our senior children was reunited by her brothers through a TV programme called Khumbula Ekhaya.

The Baptist Church also showed an interest in partnering with the Home however the national lockdown disrupted the process.

### Challenges

One of our children was involved in an assault incident that landed her with a criminal capacity and the matter dragged on from November 2019 in to 2020 till it was struck off the row. One high school was concerned for one child as they suspected that he was using dagga but tests provided otherwise.

We have three children who still do not have birth certificates; one of the children is a foreign national.

Our volunteer program is now being handled by Caroline Matona and applications still come in.

### Achievements

- Six children reunited with family
- Two children were placed into foster care
- Three children enrolled for grade 12
- Effective adherence to ARV treatment for our children recognised by the doctors at Lerato Clinic (Bertha Gxowa Germiston)
- Partnerships with other Child and Youth Care Centres such as Kids Haven,
   Carl Sithole, Abraham Kriel and Johannesburg Children's Home still
   continue
- Three children enrolled at St Anthony for short course.

### **Report from Mikayla Upiter**

The Epworth Therapy and Assessment Centre was created to function as a social enterprise servicing both the children's home and the broader community in a financially sustainable manner. The goal for the near future is to see the centre become self-sustainable. Most of the funding for the centre is acquired through the private practice business and from several grants received. The Epworth Therapy and Assessment Centre has been thriving for eighteen years and continues to grow and evolve. Without the Epworth Therapy and Assessment Centre, the Epworth Children's Village would not be able to provide the holistic, multidisciplinary, systemic care and intervention that it does.

### **Programme Objectives**

- Provide a full range of psychological services to children and families in Gauteng living in disadvantaged circumstances.
- Provide educational assessments and learning support to children experiencing barriers to learning who are unable to access these services privately.
- Provide IQ, school readiness, subject choice, and career assessments to children in disadvantaged circumstances through their schools.
- Support and develop the capacity of teachers and parents through topical workshops.
- Develop the capacity of children and teenagers through topical workshops.
- Provide services to welfare organisations to assist with correct placement of children, the development of their individual plans, services for family reunification and foster care assessment, training, and placement.
- Offer the full range of psychological services to children resident at Epworth, as well as their families, for the purposes of family reunification, learning enhancement, emotional and psychological wellbeing, life skills development and placement back into their communities.
- Develop skillful, community-minded professionals in psychology, psychometry, and counselling.

### Who Are Our Beneficiaries?

Our direct beneficiaries for this reporting period were:

- Children and families referred by the Courts, welfare organisations and Epworth Children's Village.

### Who Are Our Beneficiaries?

- Learners, parents, and teachers from partner schools and those referred by the Dept. Ed.
- Schools and sites which contract with us for intern services: Boksburg Child Welfare, Dinwiddie Primary School, Arbor Primary School, Summerfields Primary School and Buccleuch Primary School.
- Patients at the Bertha Gxowa Hospital.
- Interns and students from Wits, UJ, UKZN, UP and SACAP.

Our indirect beneficiaries are the families of children/adults who receive our services.

**Other indirect beneficiaries include** the social workers, organisations and schools who refer clients and the families of the intern psychologists, psychometrists and registered counselling students who benefit from the capacity development of the interns.

### **Highlights of the Year**

- Our 2019 interns were joined by two registered counsellors from Pearsons Institute. They provided therapy at our centre as well as at Afrikaanse Hoerskool, Germiston High, Martin Primary and Arbor Primary. We also had two Educational Psychology Masters students from the University of Johannesburg that were completing their practicum hours at the therapy centre.
- Fellyn Collins left the practice at the end of May to work full-time at her practice in Benoni. Hantie Smith, Khanyisile Bujela and Mikayla Upiter have remained in the Private Practice. Dr Gerhard Schwar also confirmed that 2020 would be his last year as a supervisor.
- The June Holiday program which was run by the interns and registered counsellors was a success. Activities included arts & crafts, anti-bullying workshops, board games and fashions show. They also enjoyed outings to The Attebury Children's Theatre, Rietvlei Zoo and Bounce.
- The interns also conducted study skills workshops with the Epworth children to assist with their homework and preparations for exams.
- The interns attended several trainings throughout the year including the S.T.E.P parenting program at Rahima Moosa Mother and Child Hospital, a workshop on the changes to the Children's Act and a Solution-Focused Workshop with Jacqui von Cziffra-Bergs and Ben Furman from Switzerland. Johan Venter held a series of workshops with the interns on the Children's Act, parenting plans and mediation.

- At the end of 2019, Germiston High School, Hyde Park High School and Chance CYCC did not renew their contract for 2020. However, a new school was confirmed for the 2020 internship program. For 2020 we have Arbor Primary, Summerfields Primary, Dinwiddie Primary, Beccleuch Primary (new) and Boksburg Child Welfare (two placements) as our beneficiaries.
  - The first student from SACAP started her practicum at our centre as well. For 2020 we have 4 interns, 2 Educational Psychology and 2 Counselling Psychology. Non are Afrikaans speaking so Hantie has agreed to assist with the Afrikaans assessments from the community list. Dr Liezel Angelouva is no longer an individual supervisor but conducts group trainings/workshops for the interns every second week for 2 hours on a particular topic.
- On the 5<sup>th</sup> March 2020, the first case of the coronavirus was confirmed in South Africa. As the virus began to spread in the country, schools were closed on 18<sup>th</sup> March 2020. On the 23<sup>rd</sup> March, President Cyril Ramaphosa announced that the country would go into a 3-week lockdown starting from midnight on the 26<sup>th</sup> March. The therapy centre was subsequently closed on the 26<sup>th</sup> March and everyone started working from home. At first, we were not sure how to react, along with the rest of the country, but we kept ourselves busy at home, and the interns continued with their assessment reports and bringing their admin up to date. As the lockdown was extended, we realised that we may have to shift our services online and we began attending online trainings and webinars to learn the ins and outs of virtual therapy.
- The interns also created information packs for their schools and sites to assist teachers and learners when they eventually returned to school.

### A Special Note of Thanks

I would like to extend our thanks to our partner schools, welfare organisations and donors who continue to support us and choose to utilise our services for their beneficiaries, even during uncertain times. We especially thank the supervisors and experienced professionals who have held and supported this program.

Without the sharing of your expertise, we would not be able to provide the services we do, and we would not be able to develop our interns into professional, skilled graduates.

### Opinion

We have audited the annual financial statements of The Epworth Children's Homes (NPC) set out on pages 7 to 15, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2020, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the annual annual financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the annual annual financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Epworth Children's Homes (NPC) as at 31 March 2020, and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-sized Entities and the requirements of the Companies Act 71 of 2008.

### **Accounting Policies**

### 1. Basis of preparation and summary of significant accounting policies

The annual annual financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-sized Entities, and the Companies Act 71 of 2008. The annual annual financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, and incorporate the principal accounting policies set out below. They are presented in South African Rands.

These accounting policies are consistent with the previous period.

### 1.1 Significant judgements and sources of estimation uncertainty

### Critical judgements in applying accounting policies

Management did not make critical judgements in the application of accounting policies, apart from those involving estimations, which would significantly affect the annual annual financial statements.

### Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The financial statements do not include assets or liabilities whose carrying amounts were determined based on estimations for which there is a significant risk of material adjustments in the following financial year as a result of the key estimation assumptions.

### 1.2 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are tangible assets which the company holds for its own use or for rental to others and which are expected to be used for more than one period.

Property, plant and equipment is initially measured at cost.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its continued use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the item, is included in profit or loss when the item is derecognised.

### 1.3 Financial instruments

### Initial measurement

Financial instruments are initially measured at the transaction price (including transaction costs except in the initial measurement of financial assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value through profit or loss) unless the arrangement constitutes, in effect, a financing transaction in which case it is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

### Financial instruments at amortised cost

These include loans, trade receivables and trade payables. Those debt instruments which meet the criteria in section 11.8(b) of the standard, are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments which are classified as current assets or current liabilities are measured at the undiscounted amount of the cash expected to be received or paid, unless the arrangement effectively constitutes a financing transaction.

At each reporting date, the carrying amounts of assets held in this category are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence of impairment. If there is objective evidence, the recoverable amount is estimated and compared with the carrying amount. If the estimated recoverable amount is lower, the carrying amount is reduced to its estimated recoverable amount, and an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

### Financial instruments at cost

Commitments to receive a loan are measured at cost less impairment.

Equity instruments that are not publicly traded and whose fair value cannot otherwise be measured reliably without undue cost or effort are measured at cost less impairment.

### **Accounting Policies**

### 1.4 Impairment of assets

The company assesses at each reporting date whether there is any indication that property, plant and equipment or intangible assets or goodwill may be impaired.

If there is any such indication, the recoverable amount of any affected asset (or group of related assets) is estimated and compared with its carrying amount. If the estimated recoverable amount is lower, the carrying amount is reduced to its estimated recoverable amount, and an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

If an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or group of related assets) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but not in excess of the amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or group of assets) in prior years. A reversal of impairment is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

### 1.5 Employee benefits

### Short-term employee benefits

The cost of short-term employee benefits, (those payable within 12 months after the service is rendered, such as leave pay and sick leave, bonuses, and non-monetary benefits such as medical care), are recognised in the period in which the service is rendered and are not discounted.

### Defined contribution plans

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are charged as an expense as they fall due.

### 1.6 Provisions and contingencies

Provisions are recognised when the company has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event; it is probable that the company will be required to transfer economic benefits in settlement; and the amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the present value of the amount expected to be required to settle the obligation using a pretax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the obligation. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

### 1.7 Government grants

Grants that do not impose specified future performance conditions are recognised in income when the grant proceeds are receivable.

Grants that impose specified future performance conditions are recognised in income only when the performance conditions are met.

Grants received before the revenue recognition criteria are satisfied are recognised as a liability.

Grants are measured at the fair value of the asset received or receivable.

### 1.8 Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that the company has transferred the significant risks and rewards of ownership of goods to the buyer, or has rendered services under an agreement provided the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the company. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding sales taxes and discounts.

Interest is recognised, in profit or loss, using the effective interest rate method.

### 1.9 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.
